

HUMAN TRAFFICKING AT PSYCHIATRIC INSTITUTIONS

As of September 7, 2018, the number of people who currently have permanent residence in the United States who were involuntarily committed to any psychiatric institution in the United States within the last 12 months is 138,537 people.

Out of the 138,537 people involuntarily committed to any psychiatric institution in the U.S. within the last 12 months:

- 42% filed a police report for being a victim of rape in this lifetime
- 20% had one or more mental disorders as defined by the diagnostic criteria of the DSM-2 or the DSM-5 at the time they were involuntarily committed within the last 12 months
- 87% were victims of rape in this lifetime as defined by any of the state laws within the United States before they were involuntarily committed within the last 12 months
- 97% were victims of rape as defined by any of the state laws within the United States during the period of involuntary commitment at the psychiatric institution within the last 12 months by a visitor during non-visitor hours
- 53% lost their legal right to vote in any state election through a Riese hearing during the period of their involuntary commitment within the last 12 months

[Editor's note: once a person has been deemed by a court as mentally incompetent through a Riese hearing, they have lost their legal right to own a firearm in that state.]
