

LEGAL PROTOCOL FOR AUTHORIZING SEARCH WARRANTS BASED EXCLUSIVELY ON POLYGRAPHIC EVIDENCE

Language used while operating a polygraph or any lie-detector machine can be manipulated to misrepresent the truth of the entire picture.

To protect oneself from misconceptions that may arrive through the presentation of information that may illuminate only a small fraction of the entire picture, it must be a rule for all judges to test each statement of a person perpetrating any type of crime (including negative character references) using their own selves as a cross reference as a person who has perpetrated the dishonorable behavior in question. Testing upon victimization should be avoided entirely, as there is no such thing as a victimless crime.

LEGAL PARAMETERS

Every statement made on a lie-detector machine that does not include a time frame is inadmissible for authorizing search warrants.

Any statement made on a lie-detector machine that violates the privacy of the subjective experience of any human being is not only inadmissible for gaining search warrants, but evidence of crime for a future lawsuit.

For any search warrant to be issued based exclusively on polygraphic evidence, three conditions must be met:

1. state or federal law was broken in a specific time frame;
2. evidence of the crime exists physically on the material realm other than the personal experience of any human being;
3. evidence of crime can be physically obtained on the material realm or a dead body may be located.

To eliminate the possibility of wrongful representation of any perpetrator or crime victim in the case of identity theft, any person referenced in evidence of crime committed must include their date of birth, place of birth, blood type, social security number or corresponding government ID number, and mother's maiden name. The names of perpetrators and crime victims are to be screened first as the legal name belonging to them, then cross referenced with identifying information.

Search warrants issued based exclusively on polygraphic evidence cannot authorize the search and seizure of anything that a traditional search warrant does not.
